Cabin News!

Phase II of the renovations at the cabin, as seen by those who participated in the 80th Anniversary activities at Homecoming, are nearing completion. Chad our contractor is still working on window restoration in the wings and has masonry work to do on the fireplaces. By the time you read this update the new floor furnace should be vented and the gas lines hooked up.

The Summer Outing was earlier than normal in June as we focused on getting the yard started. Multiple triaxle dump truck loads of top soil were rough graded by the excavating contractor and then finish graded by two past presidents, Jim Black and Craig Hunt. Without their expert tractor and tiller work it would have been a monumental job. A temporary sprinkler system was installed

using a small gasoline powered pump and whenever Mother Nature did not provide enough rain, Michael Augsperger, Mark Fair, and Dave Gordon did a great job monitoring moisture, taking care of erosion issues, and top seeding. Within a few weeks we had essence of green and by Homecoming the grass was thin but gaining ground. It was a strange growing season, and more work will be required in 2019.

Thanks to Matt, Mark, Michael, Doc, TR, Dan, Cory and Henry for their cheerful raking, rototilling, and rock picking. Thanks to Sue for managing the kitchen and Jane Gregg for a super opening day lunch.

When visiting the cabin please remember that the road drains are aggressive to protect the yard from run-off, and please do not drive past the gravel at the top of the yard. The yard is still settling, and the grass cover is still limited.

The usual summer work such as cleaning the spring and checking lights and lamps was also accomplished.

Please also make sure the basement door is closed and locked if you are the last one at the cabin to leave. With the easy to use key pad like the front door, more folks



have access and the person who opened the basement may have left before you.

A last note regarding the gas lights: please remember that the valves require a push to turn the flow of gas on, and a gentle turn the opposite way to turn them off. We have had several valves damaged from turning the handle without pushing in, and that can result in an out of control lamp. If there are flames coming up around the mantle the lamp needs repaired.

Also, the gas lights are configured for use with preformed mantles. Coleman "tie on" mantles are designed for much higher gas pressure and will not provide nearly as much light. The preformed mantles do cost more but with a little care should last several semesters.
